Carlo C. DiClemente, PhD



Dr. DiClemente is Professor and Chair, Department of Psychology, University of Maryland, Baltimore County. He is internationally recognized as co-creator (with James Prochaska, PhD) of the Trans-

theoretical Model of Change, a model that identifies stages of change and other factors that predict treatment outcomes and allows many more people to enter treatment programs at earlier stages of readiness. He is the author of more than 140 publications and currently has a book in press, *Addiction and Change: How Addictions Develop and Addicted People Recover*. He has been principal or co-investigator on 25 grant-funded research projects including four current projects, which are funded by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, National Cancer Institute, National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism and National Institute of Child Health Development.

H. Westly Clark, MD, JD, MPH, CAS, FACM



Clark is Director of the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT) under the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

He leads the agency's national effort to provide effective and accessible treatment to all Americans with addictive disorders.

Nora D. Volkow, MD



Dr. Volkow is Director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), an agency that finances more than 80 percent of the world's research on addiction and its impact. She has authored or coauthored

more than 280 peer-reviewed publications, three edited books, and more than 50 book chapters and non-peer reviewed manuscripts. She is the recipient of multiple awards for her research, and has been elected to membership in the Institute of Medicine in the National Academy of Sciences. She was named "Innovator of the Year" in 2000 by *U.S. News and World Report*.

Madras is Deputy Director of Demand Reduction for the Office of National Drug Control Policy. A former Professor of Psychobiology in the Department of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, she served

as Associate Director for Public Education in the Division on Addictions and was the recipient of a National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) MERIT award and Public Service Award. Her research on brain imaging agents was highlighted as one of 25 technology transfer innovations that changed the world.

Dr. Powell is president of the International Center for Health Concerns, Inc., a health consulting company. He assists worldwide in the education and training of behavioral health professionals. A1 | Alcohol & Adolescents

LISA HIRE CUMMINGS, PhD, NCC, LPC, LMFT, CCAP

Adolescents Track Alcohol use is on the rise in adolescents along with the tragic costs. Counseling effectively requires understanding the process of addiction in youth and how this differs from adults. Confrontation and other intervention techniques are presented. Gather new information and begin to create a new approach to an old problem.

A2 | Treatment Improvement Protocol #42: Substance Abuse Treatment for Persons with Co-Occurring Disorders

STANLEY SACKS, PhD

Special Populations Track The importance of substance abuse treatment for persons with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders is now widely acknowledged. This seminar provides an overview of treatment approaches for this population based on Treatment Improvement Protocol #42, Substance Abuse Treatment for Persons with Co-Occurring Disorders. The seminar focuses on three areas: 1) screening and assessment; 2) evidence-based practices; and 3) services integration. The final segment reviews recent developments in integrating research with practice, and discusses some emerging approaches for affecting change in programs and clinical practice. The seminar leader was Chair of TIP 42 and will provide guidance in the application of TIP 42 material for substance abuse treatment providers.

A3 | Understanding and Assessing Geriatric Substance Use Disorders

Special Populations Track Participants who attend this workshop will increase their awareness of geriatric substance use disorders, understand the complex interaction between substance use, mental health, and medical disorders, and obtain specific intervention

Adolescents Track This workshop will explore the specific issues that define adolescent treatment, developmental issues that make treatment difficult and techniques and strategies for responding to resistant clients. Recovery for adolescents requires an understanding of how their issues differ from adults, the categories of post treatment and practical techniques to engage and retain clients while in treatment. In working with resistant clients, participants will understand the do's and don'ts of working with the angry/defiant, explosive/aggressive and immature/inappropriate client.

B2 | Bridging the Gap between 12-Step Recovery and Dual Disorders

B3 | Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (FAS): The Never Ending Family Crisis

DENNIS RIDDLE, LADAC

Special Populations Track Fetal Alcohol Syndrome affects three of every 1,000 births in the U.S. Identified as a medical condition in the 70's through the study of the infants of women who used alcohol during pregnancy, research is just now addressing behavioral, educational, psychiatric and family/social issues of the child, adolescent and adult. Easily diagnosed early in life, the condition becomes difficult to identify toward adulthood. Thousands, young and old, are misdiagnosed with psychiatric disorders, learning disabilities or social disabilities resulting in loss of family, institutionalization or even imprisonment. Many create the next generation of FAS families.

B4 | Clinical Art Psychotherapy, Journey into the Inner Psyche
YVONNE JOHNSON-GILBERT, MSW, LCSW, DCSW, CCJS, RATR, CCJP, CATODC

Treatment Skills/Issues Track Art psychotherapy is an historically based and clinically updated treatment modality that can be used diagnostically or therapeutically. Art psychotherapy empowers the

fragile ego through the non-threatening process of symbolic disclosure. It remains free from the critical censorship of the superego while challenging the defense mechanisms of "denial" and "emotional shut-down" of PTSD associated with addiction.

B5 | Breathe, Stretch and Relax: Self Care in the Workplace
GAIL SKY

Workforce Development Track Breathe, Stretch and Relax is a program of gentle practical activities for use in the workplace. It will give participants energy and relieve stress through deep breathing, stretching and relaxation that can be done in an office setting. Deep breathing allows for focusing attention, stretching gives energy and relaxation reduces stress.

B6 | The Lost Voices of Addicted Women
JOAN M. ELLIS, MA, LPC, LCDC

Special Populations Track Women's growth occurs in and through their relationships. They need connections and closeness to be healthy and productive. Addictive women experience deficits in these areas, having lost the voice which tells them who they are. This workshop focuses on the help that treatment and 12-step programs give in regaining that voice.

C1 | Helping Children and Adolescents with Bipolar Disorder and a Substance Use Disorder

Adolescents Track Diagnosing a potentially disabling mental disorder in children or adolescents is distressing to the child or teen and the family. When it occurs with identification of a substance use disorder, the effect is severely disruptive. Assessment, differential diagnosis, collaboration with other professionals, engagement and empowerment strategies are explored.

C2 | What Every Counselor Needs to Know When Working with LGBT Clients

D1 | Functional Addicts: Their Impact on the Rest of Us

Treatment Skills/Issues Track Functional addicts are those individuals who fulfill their obligations in life and who think that their substance use affects only their bodies. As a result of this world view, these persons think that drug testing is unfair and that the concern of others about their use is unreasonable.

D2 | Take What You Need: Lesbians, Spirituality and A.A.

CAROLYN BRADLEY, PhD, LCSW, LCADC

Special Populations/NALGAP Track This presentation will examine the unique needs of lesbians who seek addiction recovery utilizing the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. Special attention will be addressed to the feminist critique of the appropriateness of A.A. for women due to the Program's emphasis on spirituality. Information from a qualitative study will be presented.

D3 | Chasing the Tail of the Dragon: What Every Counselor Should Keep in Mind

MARK FRATZKE MA, ABD (Psy.), MAC, CSAC, CSAPA

Treatment Skills/Issues Track Current research data suggest that drugs of abuse disrupt our memory abilities. Clearly, this may be detrimental to the effectiveness of substance abuse counseling and possibly contributes to a poor prognosis. This presentation reveals some of the possible consequences of drug use on cognitive performance. The learner will have a better understanding of the effects of chronic and acute exposure to various drugs on our ability to remember and the unique memory deficits they may have to help their client compensate for.

D4 | Integrating Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT) into Treatment for Addiction Disorders

Treatment Skills/Issues Track Establishing therapeutic alliance (TA) is pivotal in facilitating client outcomes. Presenters (two two-legged and one four-legged) will discuss a recent study using AAT in groups with individual abusing/addicted to polysubstance to facilitate TA. Volunteers will become involved in learning how to exchange tricks for skills.

D5 | Socialization and Change of Drug Involved Offenders and Treatment Teams

Special Populations Track The focus of this workshop is to examine the processes of socialization and cultural transformation of criminal justice treatment professionals and drug involved offenders.

D6 | Help Wanted: Managers to Lead Organizational Culture Change

Workforce Development Track Managers in the field are called on to lead massive change in organizational culture in response to the more complex business and regulatory environment. "Business as usual" management will not avail. This presentation shows how senior and middle managers develop their own leadership skills and build organizational readiness for the challenges.

E1 | Drugs & Gangs (and why teens think they're cool)

CARLOS D. CRUZ

Adolescents Track Cruz presents the challenges faced by parents, schools, communities and law enforcement who deal with juvenile gangs and drug dealers. Participants will explore the identification and profile of a gang member as well as why teens join them. Cruz also focuses on substance abuse and the power of financial incentives in the drug world. Drug and gang marketing are discussed as also the power of the media, graffiti, weapons, different types of paraphernalia, explosives and its easy access to youth.

E2 | Prescription Medication Misuse, Abuse and Problematic Dependence

SHARON MORGILLO FREEMAN, PhD, APRN-CS, MAC
AND ART FREEMAN, PhD

Special Populations Track Prescription medications that are used or misused for non-medical purposes lead to alterations in brain activity and eventual dependence. This workshop will help participants identify the three most common categories of prescription medications being misused and help participants become comfortable screening individuals for prescription medication misuse.

E3 | Changing Financial Templates: Helping Clients Modify Their Self-Defeating/Self-Destructive Financial Behaviors

TED KLONTZ, PhD, CSAT III, CET II, MAC

Special Populations Track Seventy-three percent of all Americans identify money issues as their # 1 stressor. Only 3 percent of mental health clients report that their therapists have ever raised the issue of their financial behaviors with them. This workshop is designed to help practitioners address this issue with their clients.

E4 | Crystal Methamphetamine in the MSM Community: Clinical, Social and Treatment Issues

STEPHEN J. LEE, MD

Treatment Skills/Issues Track/NALGAP Track This symposium will provide a general overview of methamphetamine, what makes it such an addictive drug and how it has affected the Men who have Sex with Men (MSM) community. The interactions between meth and HIV will be discussed. The workshop will also address current research on effective treatments, including specific strategies in harm reduction, abstinence-based approaches, medication therapies and MSM-specific topics, such as "being gay and drug-free" and "relearning sex."

E5 | Treating Codependence

NANCY L. JOHNSTON, LPC, LSATP

Treatment Skills/Issues Track Using her book *Disentangle, When You've Lost Your Self in Someone Else*, Johnston will present over 50 ideas, skills and techniques to help people dealing with codependence find and cultivate their self when they are over-involved with another person. These treatment ideas involve work in four areas: Illusions, Detaching, Boundaries and Spirituality.

E6 | Improving Outcomes for Males with a History of Trauma, Interpersonal Violence and Childhood Sexual Abuse

PHILIP T. McCABE CSW, CAS

Special Populations/NALGAP Track In the past 30 years, we have seen an increase of awareness pertaining to domestic violence, sexual assault, incest, rape and sexual violence, often as it pertains to women. This workshop will address the specific issues for male survivors and how, as addiction professionals, we can assist them in healing.

F1 | HIV and AIDS—The Alcohol and Other Drug Connection

RALPH RYNES, PhD, NCAC I

Special Populations/NALGAP Track This session will provide insight into the relationship between HIV, Hepatitis C and AOD addiction, with special emphasis on the emotional issues of persons living with HIV who have addiction disorders. We also explore the nature of HIV as a retrovirus and the mechanisms by which it damages the human immune system, as well as the latest medications used to treat HIV and Hepatitis C and the way they work. Finally, special considerations in counseling persons living with HIV will be discussed.

F2 | Managing Pain and Coexisting Addictive Disorders

STEPHEN E. GRINSTEAD, PhD, CADC II

Special Populations Track Chronic pain is a serious health issue and mismanaged chronic pain is one of the leading causes of prescription drug abuse. Participants will learn what is needed to help people manage their chronic pain in recovery and they will learn how to recognize the common red flags for medication abuse/addiction. This will be accomplished using a combination of lectures and experiential exercises

F3 | Clinical Evaluation and Treatment Planning

JAMES R. FLANIGAN, LCSW, CCS, MAC

AND DAVID B. JORDAN, MDIV, MAC, CAC II

Treatment Skills/Issues Track This workshop will explore the Professional Practice Dimension of Clinical Evaluation: Screening & Assessment, as outlined in Technical Assistance Publication #21 and will educate participants on the components of a treatment plan for clients with substance abuse issues. Themes included will be the process through which the counselor, client and available significant others determine the most appropriate initial course of action, given the client's needs and characteristics; as well as the ongoing collaborative process of information gathering and interpretation necessary for planning treatment and evaluating client progress.

F4 | Clinical Issues in Addressing Client Sexual History

EDWIN HACKNEY, MSW, LCSW, CADC

Treatment Skills/Issues/NALGAP Track This is an experiential training for effectively gathering information about sexual functioning and incorporating it in a treatment plan. Basic principles of sexual behavior and dysfunction will be discussed and counselors will be encouraged develop strategies for consultation and referral.

F5 | STEMSS®: Support Together for Emotional & Mental Serenity and Sobriety—A Compendium of Evidence-Based Best Practices for Treating Co-Occurring Disorders

MICHAEL G BRICKER, MS, ICADC, LPC

Treatment Skills/Issues Track This presentation looks at how elements of four recognized "Evidence-Based Practices"—Motivational Interviewing, Stages of Change, BRIEF® Therapy and 12-Step Facilitation—are integrated in a consumer-friendly format for dual recovery. The STEMSS® Model is easily replicated, and has been used for over 20 years to help people recover from co-occurring disorders.

F6 | The Chronically Homeless: People Who Are Included and Pushed Away at the Same Time

TOBY ABRAMS, MA & PHILIP F. GUINSBURG, PhD, LADAC

Special Populations Track This workshop will explore issues getting to know and treating chronically homeless men. Participants will develop a different awareness of their feelings about homeless people and a heightened sense of what homelessness is about. We will look at the question, "Is life on the streets of Anytown ever a choice?" We will consider available treatment facilities and the inadequacy of aftercare and housing.

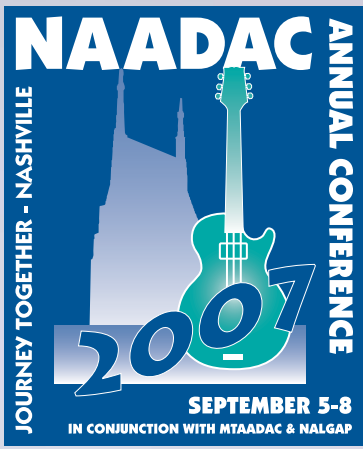
