The NAADAC's Life-Long Learning Series has evolved from NAADAC's long history of providing quality education courses led by counselors and other addiction-related health professionals who are trained and experienced in both pharmacology and clinical application of therapies. These seminars are aimed at NAADAC's 11,000 members, consisting of doctors, nurses, psychologists, social workers, counselors, prevention specialists and those who work in various clinical settings.

What is Campral?

Campral is a pharmaceutical developed by Merck Santé s.a.s., a subsidiary of Merck KGaA of Darmstadt, Germany, and is licensed to Forest Laboratories, Inc. for use in the United States. Campral is designed to help clients stay alcohol free and is intended for people who are alcohol dependent, who have decided to stop drinking entirely and are prepared to participate in counseling. Campral has been approved by the Federal Drug Administration and has been used for more than a decade in Europe.

Campral works differently than other medications for alcohol dependence. Campral is not intended to cause illness if the person drinks alcohol nor is it meant to block the “high” associated with drinking alcohol. Instead, it focuses on reducing symptoms of distress once the patient has become alcohol free. Clinical trials of Campral showed that patients on Campral are three times more likely to stay alcohol free than people taking placebo tablets. This is thought to occur by reducing the symptoms of withdrawal (anxiety, sweating, difficulty sleeping) which often lead alcohol dependents to drink again.

Why You Should Attend

Counselors are in a unique position to work with others in the addiction related health care profession. As the people who know clients best, counselors can assess treatment plans and help determine if Campral is appropriate for their clients.

This distinct seminar on medication management is specifically designed for the addiction treatment professional. The education and training program will consist of dynamic workshops, which both challenge the participant to apply the knowledge to their existing skills as clinicians, while engaging addiction professionals in case studies and peer discussion.

Participants will be provided with a comprehensive reference guide and will be able to use this curriculum in their clinical practice. Dr. Morgillo Freeman serves as the Director of The Center for Brief Therapy, PC, in Fort Wayne, Indiana and previously served as clinical director for the University of Pennsylvania Medical Center at Presbyterian. She is president-elect of NAADAC, the National Association for Addiction Professionals and the immediate past-president of the Pennsylvania Association for Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors (PAADAC). Dr. Morgillo Freeman is board certified as a Cognitive Therapist by the Academy of Cognitive Therapy, in addition to achieving national certification as an Advanced Practice Psychiatric Clinical Nurse Specialist and senior level international certification as a Master Addiction Counselor (MAC) through NAADAC. She currently serves on the Steering Committee of the Northeast Addiction Technology Transfer Center Practice Improvement Collaborative and has two masters degrees awarded in psychology and advanced practice psychiatric nursing, as well as a PhD in sociology. She has authored or co-authored numerous papers, chapters and books within her many disciplines, and has lectured nationally and internationally on the problems of substance misuse, addiction issues, cognitive behavior therapy (CBT) and chronic pain.

Presenter Biographies

SHIRLEY BECKETT MIKELL, NCAC II, SAP



Beckett Mikell is Deputy Executive Director of NAADAC, The Association for Addiction Professionals and has worked in the addiction profession for over 33 years. She began as a counselor in Charleston, South

Carolina, where she also served as trainer, manager and mentor for fellow addiction professionals. Beckett Mikell is particularly skilled in the areas of ethics, confidentiality, group and individual counseling skills and family interventions. She has previously worked in opiate replacement therapy and managed methadone treatment services in Charleston County for over 25 years. For 16 years, she served as member and chair of the South Carolina Certification Commission, and for six years she served as a member of the NAADAC Certification Commission. Beckett Mikell has provided training to addiction professionals throughout the world and she continues to advise programs in Cyprus, Egypt and Iceland.

KEITH CRAWFORD, PHD



Dr. Crawford is currently THE Clinical Director for the National Minority AIDS Education and Training Center, a research assistant professor of pharmacology at Howard University College of Medicine

and is also trained as a clinical pharmacist. Through his work, Dr. Crawford evaluates innovative approaches to the treatment of addictions and other psychiatric co-morbidities in HIV patients and explores strategies to improve clinical outcomes in minority patients with HIV disease. He has helped clinics develop comprehensive addiction treatment systems that integrate social support, clinical care and community education to build a stronger infrastructure for care. Dr. Crawford has published research and has been awarded patents for his innovations in pharmacology related to tumor biology, novel treatments for cancer and potential treatments for HIV disease. He received a bachelors degree in biology from Cornell University, a bachelors degree in pharmacy from Temple University and a PhD in pharmacology from the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. He completed a residency in clinical pharmacy and a post-doctoral fellowship at the National Institutes of Health.

Dr. Freese is the Co-Principal Investigator/Director of the Pacific South-west Addiction Technology Transfer Center (PSATTC) and has worked in the substance abuse profession since 1983. Dr. Freese received

his PhD in clinical psychology from the California School of Professional Psychology in 1995. He has served as the project director on a number of studies including research on methamphetamine use, HIV risk in gay/bisexual men and smoking cessation interventions. Dr. Freese has developed and conducted trainings for various Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT) and National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) Clinical Trials Network (CTN) multi-site projects in 15 states. He has provided clinical training and workshops for clinicians-in-training at the doctoral and masters level. Dr. Freese helped develop the materials that are being used nationally for training CTN Nodes on Good Research Practices.
