OAADAC

The Ohio Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors was incorporated in December of 1975 to provide a unified voice for staff members of alcoholism treatment, rehabilitation and recovery programs, to serve as a communication center and to act as an advocate before federal, state and regional agencies relating to alcoholism programs in Ohio.

During the 1980's, as more counselors became certified, the need for a unified voice became apparent at all levels of government and in the late 1980's the association became affiliated with the National Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors (NAADAC), and contracted with the Ohio Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Programs. Pat Liggett, OAAP Administrative Assistant, began providing administrative services for the association under the contract.

During the 1990's, under the leadership of John Roberts, Terry Leach, Don Christian, Mary Melton and John Lisy, OAADAC focused on the education and training of counselors through its chapters in Akron, Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati, Dayton and Mansfield by providing three days of extensive training each year at its Annual Conference.

Most recently, OAADAC has been assisting NAADAC in launching the congressionally-appropriated Ohio Workforce Development Project.

OAADAC Annual Conference

In the fall of each year since 1989, OAADAC has held an Annual State Conference in different areas around the state of Ohio. The 2004 State Conference will be held in Cincinnati at the King's Island Resort Center on October 6, 7, and 8. This year's conference will include 15 hours of workshops and seminars dealing with diagnostic training, licensure, workforce development and innovative treatment strategies.

There will be speakers from various areas of the workforce including licensure, college education, counseling, psychology, and management.

NAADAC

NAADAC is the largest professional membership organization that serves professionals who specialize in addiction treatment. With 12,000 members and 47 state affiliates representing more than 80,000 addiction counselors, NAADAC is the nation's largest network of addictive disorders prevention, intervention and treatment professionals. These experts are working to create healthier families and communities.

NAADAC members are powerful advocates because they are on the front lines, providing care every day to those facing addiction. Counselors provide treatment in a variety of settings including hospitals, private and public treatment centers, private practice and community-based behavioral health agencies. Addiction is a disease, and NAADAC is working to make treatment by nationally certified counselors available to every person who needs it.

Ohio Workforce Development Project

NAADAC, the Association for Addiction Professionals, has undertaken the current addiction workforce crisis. NAADAC has teamed up with Ohio organizations, including the Ohio Association of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors (OAAADAC) and the Ohio Council for Behavioral Healthcare Providers, to create the Ohio Workforce Development Project.

The Workforce Project, which is funded by Congress, has a unique perspective on solving the workforce crisis by bringing together frontline treatment professionals, treatment providers, prevention specialists, educational institutions, the certification board, and the office of the Director of the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Services (ODADAS). The Project contributors have a common goal of surveying the extent of the workforce problem in the state and implementing solutions. The long-term goal is for it to become a model for other states to emulate.

Lawrence Anthony, PhD, is currently Academic Director of Addictions Studies and Treatment Programs in the College of Education, Criminal Justice & Human Services at the University of Cincinnati. He received his doctorate in education from the University of Cincinnati in 1982. He has been a Certified Chemical Dependency Counselor (CCDC III-E) with the State of Ohio since 1983. Dr. Anthony has published in a leading probation journal, and reviews manuscripts relating to addictions for McGraw-Hill Publishers.

Pat Bridgman, CCDC III-E, serves as the Associate Director of the Ohio Council of Behavioral Healthcare Providers. She will present on workforce development in the arena of healthcare providers.

Joseph Emanuel, EdD, CCDC III-E, is in private practice and has been a psychological consultant at the Miami Valley Hospital Care Unit since 1983. He is a retired faculty member of the Department of Human Services at Wright State University. Mr. Emanuel is a certified alcoholism counselor and a licensed psychologist in the state of Ohio.

Amanda J. Ferguson is the Acting Executive Director for the Ohio Chemical Dependency Professionals Board. Previously, she was the Interim Credential Administrator for the Credentialing Unit at the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services. Ms. Ferguson is a graduate of The Ohio State University and holds a Bachelor of Arts in English.

Cameron Foster works on Youth Mentoring and the Alcoholism Council's Teen Institute to encourage positive adult-youth relationships that build individual and social skills. David Logan, MA, CCDC III-E, is the Executive Director of the Prospect House, Inc., a long-term residential treatment center in Cincinnati, Ohio. He started his association with Prospect House as a Board Member in 1981, became the Associate Director in 1986 and the Executive Director in 1988. He is a Board Member of the Association of Halfway House Alcoholism Programs of North America and a founding Board Member of the Faces and Voices of Recovery (Southwest Ohio). He has served as President of the Ohio Alcohol & Drug Policy Alliance and of the Ohio Association of Residential Recovery Services.

John Lisly, LISW, CCDC III-E, is coordinating the Workforce Development Project in Ohio for the Ohio Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors (OAADAC). He is currently the Executive Director of the Shaker Heights Youth Center. Mr. Lisly is currently on the Public Policy Committee of the National Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors. He has a Masters in Social Work from Case Western Reserve University, is a licensed Independent Social Worker, Professional Clinical Counselor, Chemical Dependency Counselor III E, and Ohio Certified Prevention Specialist II.

Currently, Mrs. Taft serves as spokesperson for Ohio's Family and Children First Initiative, a partnership of government agencies and community organizations dedicated to enabling every child to succeed.

Gary Tester, CCDC III-E, OCPs II, was appointed as the director of the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS) on July 12, 2003 by Governor Bob Taft. An Ohio Certified Prevention Specialist II and Certified Chemical Dependency Counselor III-E, Tester possesses the highest credentials possible in this field. Tester was honored with an appointment to the Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America Board of Directors in 2004. He was a member of the SAMHSA Standing Committee on Knowledge Application from 2000-2004 and has been a Grant Reviewer for a number of federal SAMHSA grants including Knowledge Dissemination, High Risk Youth, HIV/AIDS, Children's Mental Health and School Action initiatives since 1989.
